INTRODUCTION

Job is a man who is plunged into agony, and for chapter after chapter, Job is confused and angry, crying out to God in prayer. He longs to meet with God and prays that God would show up. And God does. This is the climax of the whole book. There are three things we learn about this final climactic appearance of God before Job - the argument of God, the silences of God, and God's wonderful, terrible storm.

Monday: Job 38:1-18

Job longs to meet with God face to face in the midst of his suffering and God shows up in the storm. God begins by asking Job a series of questions about the foundations of the world. What is God's main point in all of His questions? How does it make you feel about God? Do you feel that you give God the reverence he deserves?

Tuesday: Job 40: 2, 8-14

Do you think that we sometimes assume that we know as much as God? When we cannot understand the ways of God, how does faith play a role? How can we possibly completely know the purposes of God?

Wednesday: Job 40:3-5, 42:1-6

During his encounter with God, Job begins to see how awesome and loving God is and it leads to Job's response. How do you feel about Job's responses to God? Would you have responded in similar fashion?

Thursday: Job 42:7-9

After God questions Job, he turns his attention toward Job's friends that gave him miserable comfort in his time of need. Many things they said misrepresented God. In the end, Job prays for them and forgives them. Have you ever taken the opportunity to pray for your enemies? How do you feel about that?

Friday: Job 42:10, 12-17

After Job suffered greatly, God blessed him with wealth and children again. How do you feel about the restoration of Job after his suffering has ended? Would you have felt differently if Job had not been restored? Why?

MOVING FORWARD

God's purposes are far above us and our own understanding. Understandably, like Job, when we suffer deeply we often have questions ("God, why are you allowing this to happen? Why are you not responding?"). However, God is much more interested in helping us grow into the people he has called us to be. His ways are greater than our ways. And while he reveals himself to some extent through His Word, there are many things about God that remain a mystery. Trusting God during difficult times allows us to grow in our faith and in our relationship with our Creator.
