SCRIPTURE PASSAGES

Luke 14:7-11 (NIV)

⁷When he noticed how the guests picked the places of honor at the table, he told them this parable: ⁸ "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. ⁹ If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this person your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. ¹⁰ But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up to a better place.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all the other guests. ¹¹ For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

We all know people who "do good" but do so with a sour spirit or because they feel compelled to. How does the presence of love change our witness and hospitality?
- 5. As a church, we strive to welcome people into "a growing relationship with Jesus Christ." How can we better cultivate love to increase our acts of hospitality and witness?
