SCRIPTURE PASSAGES

2 Corinthians 5:11-15 (NIV)

¹¹ Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade others. What we are is plain to God, and I hope it is also plain to your conscience. ¹² We are not trying to commend ourselves to you again, but are giving you an opportunity to take pride in us, so that you can answer those who take pride in what is seen rather than in what is in the heart. ¹³ If we are "out of our mind," as some say, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. ¹⁴ For Christ's love compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. ¹⁵ And he died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again.

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INTRODUCTION

The Marvel cinematic universe is vast, extending from feature films to streaming series. In this latest Captain America film, we see how unresolved past histories, self-interest, and a desire for revenge can lead to terrible consequences for individuals and for the world. QUESTIONS

- 1. Do you have a favorite superhero? If so, who? Why do you like said superhero? What aspects of their power(s), personality, and fictional history are you drawn to?
- 2. In 2 Corinthians 5:11-15 (on page 1), the Apostle Paul appeals to the Corinthians to live into the calling of all Christians: to seek the reconciliation of themselves and the world. This requires us to be reconciled to former enemies. Do you find forgiving those that sinned against you or your loved ones easy or difficult? Why do you think that is?
- 3. In Matthew 22:37-39 (on page 1), Jesus speaks about the greatest commandments. These require full commitment; "all one's heart, soul and mind." Such love and dedication leave little room for sin and evil. How can we edge out evil and add more of Jesus to our lives today?
- 4. In John 6:66-69 (on page 1) we see a strange sight: followers of Jesus leaving him when his teachings become "too difficult." The disciples' response tells us that their lives have been completely changed by Jesus. What part(s) of the teachings of Jesus that you struggle living out?
- 5. In all these passages, we see a push to further our faith and how we live it out for the transformation of the world. As the superheroes experience in this week's "Asbury at the Movies" film, doing good can be difficult and/or go unthanked. As you work to bring God's Kingdom closer this week, is there anything special you need from God?

FINAL APPLICATION

Being a "hero," in any capacity, is a tall task. As we follow Jesus to a brighter future for all, we will face many hardships, internal and external. The temptation to go inward and "do it by ourselves" can be quite real, yet if we cast all our cares on Jesus, put our complete trust in him and continue his reconciling work, we will overcome this temptation. Where is Christ calling you today? Whom will you bless in the mighty name of Jesus?
